

Local 47 Musicians Relief Fund

The Musicians Relief Fund is used to provide relief to members of AFM Local 47 for immediate situations, such as illness or injury that prevents them from working, or the lack of funds to pay for necessities such as food and rent.

Guidelines for Applying for the Musicians Relief Fund:

- Applicant must be a member in good standing for at least one year
- Applicant must be making regular payments towards work dues
- Subsequent relief will not be granted for at least one year
- Maximum award per applicant is \$500. Executive Board may grant exception in case of a catastrophic event or illness
- Applicant must submit bills or medical records. Relief Fund checks will be issued directly to creditors
- Secretary/Treasurer's office will refer applicants to other relief sources when applicable

Music Fund of Los Angeles

The Music Fund of Los Angeles is a 501(c)3 emergency assistance fund that provides a resource to help cover daily living and household expenses when a musician is in financial distress and cannot work due to a sudden illness or injury. Musicians need not be a member of the union to apply.

The Fund was founded in 2007 by Hal Espinosa, then-President of the American Federation of Musicians Local 47, who saw a need for a charitable organization that could help musicians in financial distress. Now headed by President John Acosta, the Music Fund provides financial assistance to musicians who are unable to work due to sudden illness, poverty or other distress, provide scholarships to students of music, and to sponsor youth music programs and live music events throughout Los Angeles.

The primary hope and mission of the Fund is to help professional musicians who are struggling to maintain their dignity, support the future of music by providing scholarships, and sponsor youth music programs and live music events in Los Angeles.





Local 47 2018 General Election

The next General Election of the AFM Local 47 Executive Board, AFM Convention Delegates/Alternates and Hearing Board takes place Tuesday, Dec. 11, 2018.

Your VOTE BY MAIL ABSENTEE BALLOT request will only be honored by completing and sending a request form to the California Elections Company. Members may download and print out a pdf from the Local 47 website at: <u>afm47.org/election</u>

<u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: VOTE BY MAIL ABSENTEE BALLOTS received after 9 a.m. on election day (Dec. 11, 2018) or cast in violation of instructions in accordance with Local 47 Bylaws shall be null and void per Article IX, Section 11.

Policy Governing Eligibility to Vote in the Dec. 11, 2018 Local 47 General Election

1. All Local 47 members who are in good standing as of 4 p.m. (close of business) on Monday, Dec. 10, 2018 — the last business day prior to the 2018 General Election — are eligible to cast a ballot.

2. Any Local 47 member who has been suspended or expelled for the non-payment of dues or wishing to reinstate within one year of resignation shall have until 4 p.m. (close of business) on Monday, Dec. 10, 2018 by which to clear his/her delinquency and return to full good-standing status in order to be eligible to cast a ballot. The current reinstatement fee is \$75.

3. New members or those rejoining after resignation must complete and submit a membership application no later than Monday, Dec. 3, 2018, so that their membership can be approved at the next Local 47 Executive Board meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 4, 2018. All applicable fees apply. Note: the Local reserves the right to refer applications of all persons seeking reinstatement from resignation to the International Executive Board per Article 9, Section 19 of the Bylaws of the American Federation of Musicians of the United States and Canada.

4. Life Members who hold Inactive status do not have the right to vote in any Local 47 election. Active Life Members may vote. Inactive Life Members wishing to be restored to full Life Member status may do so by submitting payment of the difference between full Life Membership Periodic Dues and Inactive Life Membership Periodic Dues for the year. For those who wish to cast their vote in the 2018 General Election, the difference owed would be \$20 and must be paid by 4 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 10, 2018.

Notice of Prohibited Campaigning

The use of Local 47 facilities, equipment or property (including stationery, telephones, stamps and stamp machines, computers, copying machines, and any other equipment or materials) by any candidate or member, for the purpose of campaigning for or against any candidate for office in the Local 47 election, is prohibited by the Local's Bylaws and is also a violation of Federal Law. Additionally, members are barred by Article IX, Section 13 of the Local 47 Bylaws from collecting nominating petition signatures while on Local 47's premises.



In the Studio



The Film Musicians Secondary Markets Fund (FMSMF) works to serve the film, television and music communities and meet the needs of film musicians whose talents fuel the industry. To this end, the FMSMF is pleased to provide ongoing updates to Overture for the benefit of AFM Local 47 members:

Secondary Market Exploitation of Film and Television Continues To Grow! The FMSMF closed its 2018 fiscal year with the highest level of contributions in FMSMF's history: for the first time, residual contributions broke the \$100 Million threshold. FMSMF received residuals of more than **\$107 Million during FY18**, surpassing the record of \$98.4 Million set in FY17. Two major factors contribute to this continuing growth trend: First, the Fund has continued to make progress in expanding its compliance and collections program. Second, despite the reduction in residuals attributable to revenue from the distribution of DVDs, the growth in residuals attributable to revenue generated from "new media" – particularly SVOD – has, so far, made up for the losses in DVDbased residuals as depicted in the chart below.



Residuals paid into FMSMF each year are a function of consumer demand and the financial success of films, television programs and new media projects in their respective secondary markets. Although there is no guarantee that the upward trend in residuals will continue in subsequent years because it is affected by a variety of external factors, FMSMF continues to work hard to ensure that residuals due to covered musicians are paid accurately, and paid in a timely fashion. As of this writing, the first six months of the fiscal year ending 3/31/2019 has reported in. Based upon a month-to-date comparison through September 2018, FY2019 is slightly outpacing FY2018. Again, even though there is no guarantee, we are hopeful this trend will hold by the time we reach the close of FY2019 in March.

FMSMF remitted over 15,900 payments to musicians and their beneficiaries in its 2018 annual distribution.

Secondary Market Residuals Support the AFM Pension Fund: FY18 was the first fiscal year in which FMSMF forwarded a payment to the AFM-Employers Pension Fund ("EPF") as now required by the 2015 AFM-AMPTP collective bargaining agreements in order to support the health and funding status of the EPF. This payment, which allocates 1.5% of the annual residual contributions received by FMSMF and interest earnings to the EPF, became effective for the EMSME on October 1, 2017. As a result

came effective for the FMSMF on October 1, 2017. As a result, FMSMF's payment of more than \$827,000 to the EPF covered the 3rd and 4th quarters of the FMSMF's 4/1/17-3/31/18 fiscal year.

FY19 will reflect a full twelve-month allocation and remittance to the EPF from the FMSMF. The continued growth in secondary market residuals, if sustained and expanded in the future at levels consistent with the experience in recent years, will benefit all Pension Fund participants by supporting the EPF's funding.

<u>"New" Films, "New" Musicians</u>: FMSMF received residuals for more than 230 new titles during FY18. "New titles" refers to titles paying into FMSMF for the first time. Most of these newly reported titles were films and TV shows first released in 2015, 2016 or 2017, although some were older films and series that generated secondary market receipts and residuals for the first time. A complete list of the FY18 "new" titles is posted on the FMSMF website at <u>www.fmsmf.org/filmtitles/new-films.php</u>.

935 musicians were credited with residuals for the first time: 831 musicians as a result of work on original scoring sessions and 104 first timers as a result of "new use" of prior union covered sound recordings in a film or television program. During the past several years, between 800-1,000 new musicians have been added each year as FMSMF participants because they were credited with residuals for the first time.

<u>Reminder:</u> Be Sure to Update your Beneficiary Designation!

The Fund's beneficiary policies and procedures were updated in December 2017 to better empower participant musicians, protect their wishes and ensure their intentions were clearly documented and verified. The updated policy provides that musicians can now name both the beneficiary the musician wants to receive residuals after his/her death and to name an individual as the "Musician's Final Beneficiary" ("MFB") to receive residuals after the death of his/her beneficiary. If you haven't updated your beneficiary designation to take advantage of the new policies and procedures, please don't delay: <u>click here</u> for more information.

Stay Informed! FMSMF continues to provide information via *Music Notes*, the Fund's e-newsletter which is sent to participants several times each year, and has worked to keep its social media presence more current on its Facebook page, including updates on FMSMF's community outreach partnerships with Columbia University, ASCAP, SxSW and the American Film Market. On November 5, FMSMF presented a panel entitled "Score It Great!" featuring panelists Paul Broucek (president of music, Warner Bros. Pictures), Germaine Franco (composer and music producer) and Kim Roberts Hedgpeth (FMSMF executive director), moderated by Dennis Dreith, chairman of Transparence Entertainment Group.

The Fund will also present a panel at South by Southwest (SxSW) in Austin, TX in March 2019. Exact date and time is still TBD, but if you're planning to be in Austin for the 2019 SxSW Festival, we hope you'll join us.

THE LABOR WAVE: How unions carried the midterms

As the final votes are being counted, the results taking shape in the recent Midterm Elections are nothing short of historic.

In addition to the big wins we knew about the day after the election like defeating the harmful Prop 6 and electing Gavin Newsom as Governor, LABOR achieved or is trending towards other huge victories as well. Several million votes are still being counted but here's what we know so far:

Superintendent of Public Instruction and Insurance Commissioner

After trailing on election night, Tony Thurmond has made up ground on the charter school billionaire candidate Marshall Tuck every day. Tony is now leading by a slim margin and is expected to win! This is a HUGE victory for parents, teachers, kids and all working people. Congratulations to all the unions, especially the education unions, who fought so hard to elect Tony in the face of massive spending by the billionaires. The race hasn't been called yet but looks very good at this point.

Prop 6, the Republican effort to wrongly corner Democratic candidates on taxes was exposed as an attempt to wreck the funds to fix our roads. It was beat down by a relentless effort, led by the State Building Trades, and supported by the Federation and many unions.

Despite big spending by Republican-in-Independent-clothing Steve Poizner, we won the Insurance Commissioner's race. The Federation, SEIU and other unions did a late IE on Lara's behalf that helped push him over the top. Our members also played a big role in delivering this office to Lara.

Congressional races

We've won outright in four districts: CA-49 (Mike Levin), CA-48 (Harley Rouda), CA-25 (Katie Hill) and CA-10 (Josh Harder). In CA-45 (Katie Porter) we pulled into the lead yesterday and in CA-39, Gil Cisneros continues to gain. And since last week, in CA-21, TJ Cox has made up major ground against incumbent David Valadao, making that race too close to call. All told, we expect to pick up at least five congressional seats and maybe as many as seven. This is an astounding result. Democrats will hold as many as 45 or 46 of 53 seats.

The result was driven by labor. Together we intensely targeted ALL of these seats over a year ago, with strong field operations beginning in October of last year, working with a number of unions, with NextGen America, central labor councils and community groups including California Calls, Working America, Planned Parenthood and Equality California. Tom Steyer helped by matching our contributions to build the sizable field operations in each district. Member program in these districts was off the charts, too.

What made this program unique was its focus on field. We used our Million More Voters targeting technology which scored all 19 million voters on their shared attitudes with unions to target precisely the voters we needed to win. We had hundreds of thousands of conversations at the door. Just another reminder that there's no substitute for person-to-person contact. That's more true now than it's ever been.


State Senate and Assembly

We have made significant gains in the legislature. The right-wing had hoped to use Prop 6 and the gas tax as an issue against our endorsed candidates, but they failed to take out a single one of them, thanks to the intensive campaign of the Building Trades. In the state senate we picked up two seats and regained a supermajority. In the Assembly we picked up at least four seats and are waiting on more results in one final race that is too close to call in AD 16.

The election results will be certified on December 7. The California Labor Federation will send out another update with final results then and will also include some thoughts on next steps to ensure these historic victories equal bold policy to advance the interests of working people in California.

YOLA at Camino Nuevo musicians

LA Phil Announces Newest Youth Orchestra LA Site: YOLA at Camino Nuevo

The Los Angeles Philharmonic announces YOLA at Camino Nuevo, the fourth site of LA Phil Music & Artistic Director Gustavo Dudamel's Youth Orchestra Los Angeles program, through which the LA Phil and its community partners provide free, high-quality music training and academic support to over 1,200 students from vulnerable communities.

YOLA at Camino Nuevo serves hundreds of students in the Westlake/MacArthur Park area of Los Angeles and is home to the first in-school YOLA model, democratizing access to a rigorous sequential music-education-through-the-school environment, with additional music enrichment in after-school hours. Currently serving students in grades K-3, YOLA at Camino Nuevo will, over time, serve students in grades K-12 at the Kayne Siart campus and Miramar campus of Camino Nuevo Charter Academy.

YOLA at Camino Nuevo is also the site of a five-year research study by the Brain and Creativity Institute (BCI) at the USC Dornsife College of Letters, Arts, and Sciences. Titled Music Education and Human Development, the study is aimed at investigating the effects of music training on the emotional, cognitive, social, and neural development of children. This research – led by Drs. Antonio Damasio and Hanna Damasio, directors of the Brain and Creativity Institute and the Dana and David Dornsife Cognitive Neuroimaging Center at USC, and project director Dr. Assal Habibi, assistant research professor of psychology at the Brain and Creativity Institute – offers the possibility of assessing the impact of musical training on human development, from childhood to adolescence, and answering a critical question: what is the role and place of music education in school curricula?

Through rigorous research, evaluation, and documentation, YOLA at Camino Nuevo will serve as an advocacy project communicating the benefits of a K-12 music education, and as a learning laboratory and model for school districts interested in developing a progressive, sequential music education program for their students. The study is made possible by a generous grant from GRoW @ Annenberg – a philanthropic initiative led by Gregory Annenberg Weingarten, a vice president and director of the Annenberg Foundation – and by the continued collaboration and support of the LA Phil.

The new study extends the Brain and Creativity Institute's prior efforts to examine child development and music education. Results obtained to date from a study launched in 2012 and carried out in collaboration with the LA Phil and YOLA at Heart of Los Angeles (HOLA), suggest that after two to three years of music training, six- to seven-year-old children show enhanced mental and behavioral skills. Their level of brain maturation is also shown to be higher than in a comparable group of children who did not receive music training.

The launch of YOLA at Camino Nuevo is part of the LA Phil's Centennial initiatives aimed at doubling the number of YOLA students by 2021. In addition, in East Los Angeles, what began in 2014 as YOLA at LACHSA in partnership with the L.A. County Office of Education and with support from Supervisor Hilda L. Solis, is continuing this school year at East L.A. Performing Arts Magnet at Torres High School. Now known as YOLA at Torres, the program establishes a long-term relationship with LAUSD and Beyond the Bell, and allows more students in East L.A. to be served by the program.

Youth Orchestra Los Angeles (YOLA)

Through Gustavo Dudamel's Youth Orchestra Los Angeles (YOLA) program – inspired by Venezuela's revolutionary El Sistema – the LA Phil and its community partners provide free instruments, intensive music training, and academic support to over 1200 students from vulnerable communities, empowering them to become vital citizens, leaders, and agents of change. YOLA provides each student, from the ages of 6 to 18, with a strong musical and social foundation through participation in 12-15 hours of programming each week.

With YOLA sites in South L.A., the Rampart District, Westlake/MacArthur Park, and East L.A., YOLA engages students from more than 200 schools in L.A. County. Music study is complemented by leadership development opportunities, parent workshops, and performances. YOLA's young musicians have performed on great stages all over the world, including the LA Phil's two iconic venues, the Hollywood Bowl and Walt Disney Concert Hall; in many other locations throughout Southern California; on national and international television broadcasts; and alongside the greatest artists.

On August 15, the Los Angeles Philharmonic unveiled the architectural design by Gehry Partners, LLC, for its new Judith and Thomas L. Beckmen YOLA Center @ Inglewood: YOLA's first permanent, purpose-built facility.

ASMAC Town Hall The Business of Making Music Credit Where Credit is Due

The ASMAC Committee for Arranger's Rights will host a town hall style meeting addressing the advancement of rights for the creators of music arrangements and discuss the definition of various industry roles including orchestration, music preparation, synthesizer production and other digital music creation giving credit where credit is due.

The event will feature committee chair Richard Niles with Ira Hearshen and Hummie Mann (via Skype). Special guests include industry specialists Elizabeth Finch, Richard Bronskill and Marc Mann.

The discussion will outline a number of issues that have faced arrangers since the dawn of the 20th Century, resulting in arrangers becoming "Invisible Artists." Professional Musicians & Employer's Health & Welfare Fund ELIGIBILITY & ENROLLMENT INFORMATION

PROFESSIONAL MUSICIANS, LOCAL 47 AND EMPLOYERS' Health & Welfare Jund

The Fund began mailing Eligibility and Enroll-

ment information to all eligible participants mid-November. The enrollment materials advise each participant of the level at which they qualified (A, B or C).

The qualifying levels are as follows:

Level Employer Contribution Amount

- A \$1,500 plus
- B \$1,200 to \$1,499
- C \$800 to \$1,199

In order to be covered by one of the Fund's benefit plans, for the coverage year beginning January 1, 2019, you must (A) have accumulated a minimum of \$800 in employer contributions, for covered work performed between October 3, 2017 through October 2, 2018, and (B) remit, to the Fund's Administrative Office, a completed enrollment form along with the proper co-premium, no later than December 20, 2018.

Information about the Benefit plans, including Summaries of Benefits and Coverages, is posted on the Fund's website:

<u>www.pacfed-musicians.com</u>

The Professional Musicians, Local 47 and Employers' Health & Welfare Fund 's website contains information, documents and forms that are helpful to Fund participants. Most of the information is provided in PDF format to allow for easy download, to save or print, etc.

What Benefit Levels Are Available

The Welcome page on the Fund's website shows the various benefit levels that a musician may obtain based upon proper contributions from a Participating Employer. A Participating Employer is one that has signed a valid collective bargaining agreement that requires the Employer to contribute — on behalf of all engaged musicians — to the Professional Musicians, Local 47 and Employers' Health and Welfare Fund. Thus, an Employer "properly" contributes to the Fund where (A) the contributions to the Fund are remitted for actual work that was performed and (B) the applicable AFM or Local 47 collective bargaining agreement requires the Employer to contribute, on behalf of all engaged musicians, to the Fund.

What Benefits Does The Fund Offer?

The Fund offers a variety of benefits and benefit options. To view these benefits – when at the Fund's website – select the **Ben**efits link associated with each benefit level; on this page, you may view the array of benefits offered to musicians who qualify for coverage under the Fund's rules and regulations and for the specific level of qualification (e.g., \$800-\$1,999; \$1,200-\$1,499; \$1,500 and above). Also located on the Fund's website is the "Summary of Benefits": this document is a brief summary of the various benefits sponsored by the Fund. The other important downloadable document perched within the Fund's website is the Explanation of Coverage (EOC): this is a larger booklet, issued by the insurance companies which actually provide and administer the benefits the Fund has contracted for, and which have detailed coverage information regarding the precise benefits each carrier provides. You are entitled to receive the EOC for the coverage you enroll in.

How Do I Enroll?

The Fund will send you a notice in the mail advising you of your eligibility level. If you receive a notice of eligibility, log onto the Fund's website – at <u>www.pacfed-musicians.com</u> – to view the benefits for which you may be eligible. After reviewing the benefit information, select the benefit that best suits your situation and applies to your qualification level, complete the enrollment form that is included in with the eligibility notice the Fund mailed to you and return the completed enrollment application, along with the proper co-premium (very important! The Fund cannot process your enrollment application without the co-premium remittance) to the Fund office at:

What Does It Cost?

When at the Fund's website, select the Rates link to view the monthly premium rates for the eligible participant, dependents for all levels of coverage. As many of you are aware, in addition to qualifying for and enrolling in the benefit plan, you must pay a portion of the premium (called the "participant co-premium").

How Can I Contact a Fund Representative?

When at the Fund's website, select the **Contact** link to obtain information about how to contact the Fund. The Fund is administered by PacFed Benefit Administrators and on the Contact page you will find the Administrator's location, telephone numbers, fax number and email address.

How Do I Find an In-Network Doctor or Dentist?

When at the Fund's website, select *Providers* on the menu to find a provider affiliated with one of the Blue Shield, Kaiser or Delta Dental plans. The *Providers* page has instructions on how to find a provider for the benefit plan in which you are enrolled.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

The FAQ page connected to the Fund's website has information on how to use your HMO or PPO health plan. The FAQ page also has information on Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA), Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) and Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1986 (COBRA).

What Happens If You Do Not Receive a Notice of Eligibility

If you believe that you performed enough covered work to have sufficient employer contributions to make you eligible for benefits, but you did not receive an eligibility notice, call the Fund's Administrative Office at (818) 234-0222 to speak to an eligibility specialist.

Should you exhaust your avenues through the Fund's Administrative Office and believe that your eligibility issue has not been resolved, you may file a written appeal with the Fund's Board of Trustees. For more information on how to file and when to file an eligibility appeal, please check the *"Policies"* page on the Fund's website.

Multiple-Card AFM Member Rebate

Did you know? If you hold membership in three or more Locals throughout a full calendar year, you are entitled to a rebate from the AFM.

Under the rebate program, membership in a base of two Locals must be established in order for a member to qualify for a rebate. The International Secretary/ Treasurer's office has determined that a musician's membership in his or her "Home Local" and the subsequent Local of longest tenure shall be designated as the two base Locals. The Secretary/Treasurer's office will then rebate the appropriate per capita dues for membership in the third Local and any other Local(s) beyond three to which a member belonged for the entire previous calendar year.

To petition for a Multiple-Card Member Rebate, members should fill out the form and return it to the Secretary/Treasurer's office together with copies of all their paid-up membership cards, receipts of canceled checks for annual dues from all Locals, or a letter from each Local stating that the petitioner was a member in good standing of the Locals for the full year prior. Rebates will be issued after Jan. 1.
