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May Day is a holiday rich in history and folklore, celebrating the return of spring as well as commemorating the historic struggles and gains made by workers

and the labor movement.

Celebrating victories in the music

industry and the greater

In dozens of countries around the world, May Day has been recognized as a public holiday, and it continues to be celebrated with picnics and parties while serving as the occasion for demonstrations and rallies in support of workers.

In 1889 an international federation of socialist groups

and trade unions designated May 1 as a day in sup-

port of workers, in commemoration of the Haymar-

ket Riot in Chicago of 1886. Five years later, U.S. Pres. Grover Cleveland, uneasy with the socialist origins of Workers' Day, signed legislation to make Labor Day — already held in some states on the first Monday of September — the official U.S. holiday in honor of workers. Canada followed suit shortly thereafter.

Today, despite the challenges of organizing during a deadly pandemic, working people across the country and beyond continue organizing, bargaining and mo-

bilizing for a better life. Here at AFM Local 47, since

taking office in 2021, President Stephanie O'Keefe

has successfully completed negotiations or exten-

sions for over 20 collective bargaining agreements including Musical Theatre Guild, Thousand Oaks Philharmonic, and the Greek Theater. Among these are several new employers with exciting new projects like Great American Songbook Orchestra and Open Fist Theatre. Currently there are over 30 ongoing negotiations with both previously contracted employers and new productions like the LA Film Orchestra and SoFi Stadium. A small sampling of the many recent labor wins here in California and on the national level include: An Amazon warehouse on Staten Island made history last month when more than 8,000 workers became the first location to vote to unionize, favoring the union by more than 10 percentage points, though Amazon is seeking to overturn the result.

Rehearsals are Back!





Musicians, Artist Rally for Arts **Education in California** At the campaign kickoff for the Vote Arts and Music

California ballot measure at Hamilton High School in Los Angeles on April 26, 2022, former LAUSD superintendent Austin Beutner, AFM Local 47 member Will.i.am, parents, teachers, Hollywood trade unions, and long list of celebrities and supporters rallied together to raise awareness about increasing funding for arts and education in California public schools. The initiative petition garnered more than 1 million

unteers from across the state, well in excess of the 623,200 valid signatures needed to qualify for the November 2022 California ballot. The initiative has garnered support from top Hollywood entertainers including AFM Local 47 mem-

bers Linda Ronstadt, David Crosby, Stephen Stills, Lili

"If approved by a majority of voters this fall, the measure would allocate \$800 million to \$1 billion per year


to arts and music education in K-12 schools. "One of the goals of the initiative is to help diversify the ranks of the entertainment industry, which remains disproportionately white. The funding formula

for the money would be tilted toward low-income districts. "The signature verification process is expected to be completed in July. To qualify for the ballot, the initiative must have 623,200 valid signatures. The money would be allocated out of the state's general fund, and would be on top of the minimum school funding

thresholds set by Proposition 98. The measure would

not raise taxes."



The Professional Musicians Local 47 and Employers

Health & Welfare Fund is administered by PacFed

Benefit Administrators. AFM Local 47 negotiates benefits on behalf of our members. The Health & Welfare Trust provides medical, dental, vision, chiropractic, acupuncture, prescription drugs and life insurance to musicians who qualify for benefits based upon contributions received on their behalf in accordance with Local 47 and AFM contracts and

collective bargaining agreements. Eligibility Eligibility for enrollment in the Health & Welfare

Fund is based upon contributions the Fund receives

on musicians' behalf from Participating Employers.

A Participating Employer, or an Employers' Payroll Designee, has entered into a Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) with the Union which calls for contributions to come to the Health & Welfare Fund. All contributions must come from a Participating Employer; musicians may not "self-pay" into the Heath & Welfare Fund. Coverage A musician may qualify at one of three levels: Level A (\$1,500+ contribution), Level B (\$1,200-

\$1,499 contribution), and Level C (\$700-\$1,199

AMERICAN FEDERATION OF MUSICIANS & EMPLOYERS' PENSION FUND (AFM-EPF)

One of the most important benefits your job provides you with is the ability to receive pension benefits when you retire. Even though you can collect Social Security at retirement, your retirement years will be more financially secure if you also receive pension benefits. The American Federation of Musicians and Employers' Pension Fund (AFM-EPF) is a defined benefit multi-employer pension plan for members of the American Federation of Musicians.

Under a collective bargaining agreement with the AFM and its Local unions, or other written agreement acceptable to the Board of Trustees, your employer has agreed to make contributions to a pension fund to provide pension benefits to you and other employees working as musicians. The Pension Fund is operated by the AFM-EPF Board of Trustees, which consists of an equal number of Federation Trustees and Employer Trustees.

You should keep in mind that you are not guaranteed a pension just because a pension fund has been established to which your employer contributes. The Pension Fund has rules about how you begin to participate, how can you earn a right to your pension, how much you might receive and when you can start getting payments, what happens to your pension if you die before or after retirement, and many other issues. LA Fed Announces Ambitious New 'People's Project'

On Cesar Chavez Day, March 31, 2022, over 1,600 union members gathered together for the first time in over two years due to the pandemic at the Westin Bonaventure Hotel for the Los Angeles County Federation of Labor 2022 Workers Congress.

During the Congress, the LA Fed announced an ambi-

tious new initiative to make mutual aid a permanent part of L.A.'s labor movement. The People's Project, a mutual aid program funded with a \$20 million grant from the state of California whose mission is to establish an organizing platform for reciprocal aid and cooperation in Los Angeles that scales with the community needs. By empowering communities, block by block, the People's Project aims to provide needed resources to the people of Los Angeles County and match people to the services they need.



Workers Congress also featured organizing workshops and an engaging plenary session. Highlights of the Workers Congress included hearing from the keynote speakers: incoming CA Labor Federation President Lorena Gonzalez; esteemed educator, activist and author Dr. Angela Davis; and LA Fed President Ron Herrera. Attendees also heard from special guests: AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler, UNITE HERE Local 11 Co-President Susan Minato; LA Fed VP Yvonne Wheeler; and International Association of Fire Fighters General Secretary-Treasurer Frank V. Lima.


