

Officer Reports

President Stephanie O'Keefe



"The time is always right to do what is right."

- Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

As I sat down tonight to write to you all, I found myself thinking of this quote, one of my favorite quotes of Dr. King's, and one that I think of often.

We find ourselves at a crossroads in our profession. Music is more available to the public — more cheaply — than ever before. Corporations are finding more and more ways to monetize our efforts, all the while searching forways to avoid compensating us.

At the same time, large numbers of highly trained and qualified musicians are graduating from music schools each year, eager to participate in the world of professional music.

And the public find themselves with practically infinite entertainment opportunities – all without leaving their home.

Against this backdrop, we have the AFM and, more specifically, Local 47, striving to ensure that professional musicians receive respect, fair wages, benefits, and safe working conditions.

I frequently find myself reminding employers of the intrinsic value not only of music, but of the musicians who create it. On occasion I have had to literally remind employers of just who they're dealing with – highly talented and creative people whose services are extremely valuable. I am sometimes astonished at employers' proposals of substandard wages and working conditions and am equally astonished at the ease with which those proposals are amended when musicians hold their ground and employers are reminded of the actual value of our product.

But what does this all have to do with Dr. King's

Simply put, we must continue to stand for ourselves — for well-written, fair contracts, and benefits that help us receive healthcare and prepare us for retirement. And we MUST enforce those contracts. For if we do not value our work and our products, how can we expect others to do so?

Is this easy? Not always — some might say, in the current climate, never.

But make no mistake — telling musicians that they and the music they create is not valuable is a lie. And those who attempt to perpetuate that lie know full

well just how false it is.

Juggling urgent priorities is central to our role as Officers of Local 47. We have to deliver as best as possible on the **business of**



"business unionism" — processing, administering, enforcing, searching for efficiency and effectiveness. Then, there are always flash fires igniting with urgent, short term issues on behalf of members. Throughout all, it's critically necessary to keep our eye on long-term, strategic goals and needs. It's this last category that's so hard to keep focused on!

We must train our sights on the twin contract campaigns for Television Videotape, and Film and Film Television contracts. The stakes are critical for all AFM musicians; winning a fair share for musicians in the streaming economy will provide industry-standard compensation for musicians, but also provide a solid, transformational revenue source for our Local and the AFM as a whole.

Agreement. We were able to ink an agreement (subject to ratification by the affected musicians), which will provide a number of improvements to the contract. We made real economic gains, which the AFM will be sharing in the ratification packet. One step forward that we are proud of is the inclusion of Juneteenth as a paid U.S. holiday — this will be the first AFM national contract to include Juneteenth as equal in importance to July 4th, Christmas Day and other traditional holidays. We made progress on economics, and progress on history.

We now have a referral service available for members seeking live performance work. Our Executive Board decided last year to incorporate

AFM Entertainment into our website, and we

The more 47 members who participate, the more attractive AFM Entertainment will be to employers. Keep a lookout for more information from Local 47 — and check out the site. Uploading your info and your media is easy and seamless!

That new computer system, Ensemble 2, has been complicated and consuming to shepherd to completion. All of the various modules needed by our different staff areas, including membership, electronic media, live performance, hearing board and more are fully developed. We are now in a full-

fledged testing phase, coordinating schedules and running in-person and online meetings between our computer programmer and all of our different staff groups. Once this phase is complete, we will begin the implementation process. You can expect to see a clearer, easier, more efficient and real-time web interface for membership, work dues and other member needs online. Staff will benefit from greater efficiencies, and our development costs will finally be behind us. All of this has taken longer than we wanted or expected. We know from the experience of other Locals, our various Funds, and other unions that have gone through similar redesigns that this is normal (if frustrating). But the end is in sight, and the rewards will be tremendous. Not only are our rehearsal rooms available for more hours now, but we have begun rentals for our large

room downstairs. We invite orchestras and groups of all sizes to hold events and rehearsals in this beautiful, acoustically grateful space. And remember — These rooms are a key member benefit. Members get rates not available to the public!

This year will be one of change, and growth for Local 47. Please let me know how you feel about where we are headed, and what your issues are. We are always stronger together!

Gail Kruvand's career as


a bassist in New York City spanned 40 years. She worked in many areas including the major orchestras of Lincoln Center, freelance concerts, recording and Broadway. As a member of the New York City Opera Orchestra (and eventually personnel manager) she was on the orchestra committee and elected as a delegate to ICSOM, one of the five Player Conferences in the AFM.

Her interest in how people organize themselves to "get things done" from school PTAs concerned with their childrens' education to orchestra committees seeking better contracts to freelancers who must stand together or fall apart naturally led to union involvement.

In addition to her service on the Executive Board at Local 802 from 2010-2017, she graduated from the Cornell University Union Leadership Institute in 2014. Additional studies resulted in a Certificate in Labor Relations from the City University of NY in 2015.

Gail was appointed as a rank-and-file trustee to the American Federation of Musicians and Employers' Pension Fund in 2017. As a delegate to the AFM Convention in 2013 and 2016, she chaired the Measures and Benefits Committee in 2016.

Black History Month

can of Black History Month. Have you ever wondered why this month of remembrance occurs in February each year? The relevance of February goes back to 1926, when the founder of the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH), Dr. Carter G. Woodson, first established "Negro History Week" during the second week of February. This week was selected because it encompasses the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass—both men being great American symbols of freedom.

search, preserve, interpret and disseminate informa-

tion about Black life, history and culture to the global community — selects the theme for Black History month. The theme for 2023 is "Black Resistance," a pointedly important designation as our nation continues to suffer in crisis mode about police brutality against Black lives. Nearly 179 years ago, the Rev. Henry Highland Garnett proposed that the only path to freedom, justice, and equality; self-determination; and/or social transformation is resistance. In thunder tones, Garnett shouted, "Let your motto be resistance! resistance! RESISTANCE!"

Black people have had to consistently push the United States to live up to its ideals of freedom, liberty, and justice for all. Systematic oppression has sought

to negate much of the dreams of our griots, like

Langston Hughes and Zora Neale Hurston, and our

freedom fighters, like the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Septima Clark, and Fannie Lou Hamer fought to realize. Black people have sought ways to nurture and protect Black lives, and for autonomy of their physical and intellectual bodies through armed resistance, voluntary emigration, nonviolence, education, literature, sports, media, and legislation/politics. Black led institutions and affiliations have lobbied, litigated, legislated, protested, and achieved success.



including white and state sanctioned violence (i.e. Billie Holiday's "Strange Fruit"), sexual politics (i.e. Salt-N-Pepa's "Let's Talk About Sex"), as motivation, for strength against harassment, and to experience freedom.

The Black artists, writers, photographers, and musicians who participated in the Black Arts Movement, the Harlem Renaissance, and the Chicago Black Renaissance were the soundtrack and the visual representation of resistance movements. These individuals created art that supported the resistance movements, but also provided a space for Black people to

express love and joy. Creatives used poetry, fiction,

short stories, plays, films, and television to counter

Black people in it.


Raphael Saadiq

Singer, record producer and songwriter Raphael Saadiq has produced tracks for a number of R&B heavyweights, such as Mary J. Blige and John Legend, as well as releasing a number of critically-acclaimed records, both as a member of Tony! Toni! Toné! and as a solo artist.

Raphael Saadiq grew up in a musical family and

neighborhood. The Oakland native was engrossed in music as a child. He started playing bass at the age of six, taught by an older brother — among a dozen other siblings in a blended family — and received additional tutelage from some of the fellow budding musicians in his community. Before long, he was playing in groups, first as a kid with the Gospel Hummingbirds, and benefitted from the strong music pro-

gram at Castlemont High School.

Shortly after he turned 18, he heard about auditions

fessional career with the R&B dance trio Tony! Toni! Toné! The band became major R&B stars throughout the late 1980s and 1990s. Raphael's next project was the group Lucy Pearl, with Dawn Robinson of En Vogue and Ali Shaheed Muhammad of A Tribe Called Quest. His biggest solo hit came in 1995, with the release of "Ask of You," which

peaked at number 19 in the U.S. His debut solo album titled "Instant Vintage" was released in 2002 and earned him five Grammy nominations. This was followed by "Ray Ray" in 2004 and a two-disc live album, "All the Hits At the House of Blues." His third solo LP, "The Way I See It" released in 2008, earned three Grammy nominations, including Best R&B Performance By a Duo or Group with Vocals for "Never Give You Up," which featured Stevie Wonder and CJ Hilton. Throughout the years, while also releasing additional solo LPs, Raphael surfaced on recordings by collab-

orators crossing cultures and generations, from Larry Graham, Booker T. Jones, and Elton John to Andra Day, Big K.R.I.T., and Miguel. Most prominently,

he was a key factor in Solange's number one 2016 album "A Seat at the Table" as the co-writer and co-producer of eight songs, including "Cranes in the Sky," and also credited beside the singer as executive producer. As a producer, Raphael has worked on a number of successful tracks by artists including Otis and Shugg, D'Angelo, Tupac Shakur and Joss Stone. He has also collaborated with the likes of Whitney Houston, the Isley Brothers, and Erykah Badu. In 2011, Raphael

led the band backing Rolling Stones' singer Mick Jagger for his performance of Solomon Burke's "Everybody Needs Somebody to Love" at the 53rd Grammy Awards show in Los Angeles. In 2002, Raphael found-

ed his own record label, Pookie Entertainment.





Hal Blaine to Receive Star on Walk of Stars Palm Springs

This month legendary drummer Hal Blaine will posthumously receive his star on the Walk of the Stars Palm Springs.

The ceremony will take place at 2:30 p.m. on February 6, the day after what would have been his 94th birthday, at 100 N Palm Canyon Dr. An after-party will be held at Oscar's restaurant in Downtown Palm Springs.

A Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award winner and Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inductee, Blaine started his career as a prolific drummer and session musician in the late 1940s. Widely regarded as the most recorded studio drummer in history, as a core member of the Wrecking Crew he performed on more than 35,000 sessions and 6,000 singles, and his drumming is featured on 150 U.S. top 10 hits, 40 of which went to number one. Among the countless hits he recorded include:

Health & Welfare Fund is administered by PacFed Benefit Administrators. AFM Local 47 negotiates benefits on behalf of our members. The Health & Welfare Trust provides medical, dental, vision, chiropractic, acupuncture, prescription drugs and life insurance to musicians who qualify for benefits based upon contributions received on their behalf

in accordance with Local 47 and AFM contracts and

collective bargaining agreements. Eligibility Eligibility for enrollment in the Health & Welfare Fund is based upon contributions the Fund receives on musicians' behalf from Participating Employers. A Participating Employer, or an Employers' Payroll

PENSION

AMERICAN FEDERATION OF MUSICIANS & EMPLOYERS' PENSION FUND (AFM-EPF)

One of the most important benefits your job provides you with is the ability to receive pension benefits when you retire. Even though you can collect Social Security at retirement, your retirement years will be more financially secure if you also receive pension benefits. The American Federation of Musicians and Employers' Pension Fund (AFM-EPF) is a defined benefit multi-employer pension plan for members of the American Federation of Musicians.

Under a collective bargaining agreement with the AFM and its Local unions, or other written agreement acceptable to the Board of Trustees, your employer has agreed to make contributions to a pension fund to provide pension benefits to you and other employees working as musicians. The Pension Fund is operated by the AFM-EPF Board of Trustees, which consists of an equal number of Federation Trustees and Employer Trustees.

You should keep in mind that you are not guaranteed a pension just because a pension fund has been established to which your employer contributes. The Pension Fund has rules about how you begin to participate, how can you earn a right to your pension, how much you might receive and when you can start getting payments, what happens to your pension if you die before or after retirement, and many other issues. The People's Project Celebrates Inaugural Year

In March of 2022, the LA Fed's 2022 Workers Congress in Downtown Los Angeles celebrated the launch of The People's Project. The first and largest project of its kind in the history of Los Angeles, The People's Project will reach over 2 million workers by connecting them to vital aid and services such as rental assistance, child care, mental health services, housing, food accessibility and more.

From the outset, The People's Project vowed to train hundreds of essential union workers to be the first point of contact to assist workers and communities in accessing the resources they need. It also pledged to conduct a massive outreach project throughout the County of Los Angeles to ensure that community resources are being distributed equitably and that our underserved communities are receiving the services they need most.

"Black and Brown communities are an integral part of

Los Angeles County. Unfortunately, they also live with a historical legacy of poverty, homelessness, and discrimination," said Dr. Melina Abdullah of the California Faculty Association. "These issues impacted our communities before the pandemic, but now our society's collective awareness has grown, recognizing the need for genuine systemic change. I am excited that the People's Project has the potential to empower millions of people of color throughout Los Angeles County, in particular, Black and Brown Women to get the resources they need so that our communities can thrive."

10,000 working Angelenos all over L.A. County, has serviced over 90,000 people, and assisted over 22,000 households. From providing food aid, rental assistance, organizing trainings, and beyond, the project has positively impacted L.A.'s most underserved communities including South L.A. and the San Fernando Valley. In addition, by partnering with vital community organizations like IBTU, Miss Rodger's Neighborhood, Project 43, Aaron Community Cultural Center and Shields for Families, they have uplifted and empowered communities to take back their power, block by block.

"Our work has the potential to change millions of people's lives for the better in L.A. County," said Becky Alvarez, People's Project Director. "By organizing person to person, block by block we are getting a true understanding of what working families in L.A. County need in order to thrive and live with dignity and respect. The pandemic shined a light on societal ills that had been present in our neighborhoods for decades. I'm excited that we are now rolling up our sleeves and getting to work to build the power of working people to make a lasting change that will benefit our communi-

ties for generations to come."
